With tear-strung pools of long dreamt storms ...



- Presences and Sentience





Ngurra: The Dreaming

- "All things formed during the Dreamtime carried with them a vibrational memory that holds the memories that birthed that place... the blueprint of the ancestral spirits whose actions helped shape the land. The memory stored within the land is what we refer to as 'The Dreaming', which represents the primordial sacredness of the earth.
- The Dreamtime was the time before time... the Dreaming describes the continuation... in today's world and remembering that sacred time still exists within the spiritual lives of Australia's Aboriginal people to this day."


Spun silence sung,









Mother's Love

Can you remember me? I am Enduring, Timeless.




My track is hidden, respecting Mother's face,

Can you feel me?


I am Enduring, Timeless.

Can you touch me?


I am Timeless, Enduring.
